Introduction to Buenos Aires, capital of vibrant Argentina

Argentina is a South American republic that is characterised mainly by its enormous capacity for agricultural and livestock production, the beauty of its landscapes and the extraordinary kindness of its people.

With a growing prestige, its capital, the city of Buenos Aires, has risen from position 42 to 25 this year 2018, in the QS Best Student Cities qualification, to make it the highest rated city in Latin America. Undoubtedly, the capital of Argentina has the highest level of study opportunities in the continent, as well as the most attractive academic offer in the Spanish-speaking world. 

OTHER EDUCATIONAL OFFERS AND OPTIONS IN BUENOS AIRES

The UBA (University of Buenos Aires), is one of the most prestigious Argentine universities, with about 2,000 students of Spanish as a Second Language each year, and about 6,700 foreign students studying different college degrees. You can take Spanish courses that take from 1 to 8 months, although they can also be made even longer. There is a wide range of academic offers to learn Spanish in almost all Argentine provinces, with courses and other study options.

Students of Spanish in Argentina have the possibility of obtaining the prestigious academic certificate known as CELU (Certificate of Spanish Language and Use), a certificate of proficiency in Spanish as a foreign language. The CELU is a certificate recognised by the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the República Argentina.

Essential equipment for students in Buenos Aires

It is important to keep in touch with our team of advisors, in case you have any questions or doubts, especially regarding what you will need in this new student adventure in the southern hemisphere.

Argentina has a high quality of textile production and footwear, so it is possible that you don't have to bring everything you need from home, and that you may buy these things after your arrival in Buenos Aires.



Let's see how different it is to the northern hemisphere:



Summer starts by the end of December and lasts until mid-March, with average temperatures around 25 degrees C during the day, but they could easily climb to 35 degrees, especially midday. Fortunately, Summer nights are much cooler.



Fall, which begins by the third week of March, refreshes the city and we might need longer sleeves, heavier stockings and thicker pants.



Winter arrives almost at the end of June, where a good coat, thermal underwear, a scarf, a warm hat and probably boots are essential.



Spring begins at the end of September and lasts until March, when you might be covered only by a light overcoat and some of your lightest sweaters.

Many students prefer the "Staying with a host family" option when they move away from their own homes for the first time. Most of the time, accommodation in homestay families is catered full board (breakfast lunch & dinner), and the host family shares their meals with our students.

In Buenos Aires you will find a wide range of hotels and hostels for students. There are also many university residences, which have nice residential dorms and other accommodation for students who come to Buenos Aires to study and stay for long periods.

Various types of rooms are offered, from singles to quadruples, with private or shared bathrooms. In some residential agreements you will also find that they offer full or half meal services.

If you choose this option, to live on your own, most likely you will have to take care of your laundry. That can be easily done at public laundries, which are known as "lavaderos", where you leave your clothes to be washed, dried and folded for a small fee. You may even leave your own soap and softener and they will follow the washing instructions that you leave them. There are plenty "lavaderos" in each neighborhood, and almost in every block. Its use is very popular and wide spread. However, there are also hostels that offer laundry and clothing drying areas.

Make sure you ask the conditions offered by each of these many options for student accommodation in Buenos Aires, since each one has its own rules and regulations.

Another thing to consider when you live on your own is your food. You may want to ask beforehand if the hostel or residence that you have chosen, has a kitchen for general use, or if you are authorized to have a refrigerator, a kitchen or a microwave in your room.

The Spanish of Argentina and only of Argentina!

Each Spanish-speaking country has its idiomatic customs. Argentina is not an exception. We will provide you with some everyday words that can be useful, especially once you learn that "vos" replaces "tú", in a colloquial or informal way, as well as "sos" instead of "eres".

How much money will I need for my student life in Buenos Aires?

In order to **study** in Buenos Aires your budget will depend on your area of residence, as the cost of accommodation for students may vary according to the type of accommodation and chosen location.

We advise you to do exhaustive research on what's on offer for students in Buenos Aires. You may find lots of chats and web pages with this information. Look well at the reviews that each place has. Investigate. Do your homework.

The costs for one single accommodation could fluctuate between 5,000 and 10,000 Argentine pesos, but this can also change in the very variable current economy of the country.

NOTE: These calculations are all in pesos and valid at time of publication, September-October 2018 **Eating** in Buenos Aires has a wide range of options. The good news is that almost everything you eat in this city is of excellent quality and at a very good price! It is well known that nowadays, a full meal for a person in a good restaurant, will never be less than 500 pesos. However, you can eat at any fast food chain for less than 300 pesos and this will include your drink. There are many economical, healthy and practical options such as hamburgers, pastas and pizzas in every street of Buenos Aires.



Another very important point for a foreign student in this city, is learning to **move around,** since the urban transport of the city of Buenos Aires is one of the largest and better organised and connected in the world. To use public transportation, it's necessary to purchase the SUBE Card, a plastic card that you will use to pay for transport, with which you will travel on trains, buses and buses alike, each one at its own price. You have to do your research regarding the cost of these fares, as they usually change. Please notice that you can't pay taxis (*remis*) with your SUBE card. You buy this card at subway or suburban train stations, and you can recharge them with little money in multiple locations such as newspaper and magazine kiosks, which you locate almost in every block of the city.

To calculate your trips, a single ticket of the *Subte* (Subtepass)-Underground- has a price of 7.50 pesos. There is the possibility of buying tickets of 1 or 10 trips, although the rate is not reduced by purchasing several at the same time.

The network of buses and metro and urban and suburban trains are very well complemented with the ground transportation of buses and taxis, in every conceivable direction inside and outside the city.

Something very convenient is that the rates that apply to your SUBE card are decreasing throughout the day, as you use it. The more trips by *Subte* or buses (called "*colectivos*") the lower the cost per trip. Great!

How can you save money as a student in Buenos Aires

First and foremost, moving around the city with your SUBE card, learning to use the connections between the multiple options that this transport provider offers you.

Also, Buenos Aires has its own Bicycles Public Transportation System, now with automatic stations, that provides you with the ECOBICI card, so you can enjoy free use of very good and sturdy bikes, to ride 24/7 all year round. So, within the city there is a network of bicycle paths that help you to travel everywhere. In addition, the city of Buenos Aires offers bicycles for free by train stations and other locations where there are high movements of people.

Regarding **food and groceries** for your personal use, you will always have a store near home, so you can rest assured that you will be perfectly able to compare prices, and buy your groceries at those places where you might find them most economical.

There are very attractive offers for frequent buyers in several large supermarket chains, and you will always have the quick option of small grocery stores within your own neighborhood.

The Cafes and "Confiterias" offer economic packages of semi-sweet croissants called "medialunas", that come in two varieties: made with or without butter, that you can store in your bedroom to spare yourself of an expensive breakfast, accompanied by a cup of tea or coffee that you could prepare in your place of residence.

Distances and costs from / to Buenos Aires and Ezeiza Airport

Air tickets can be obtained inexpensive online or purchased directly to an airline, but always bear in mind the cost of arriving at the airport and traveling to your final destination in Buenos Aires, which depending on the option chosen can weigh -and much- in the traveler's pocket.

Taking as a starting point the city center of Buenos Aires, the fares of a taxi ("remis") range between \$1,200 and \$1,400 to get to and from Ezeiza Airport (main Buenos Aires airport), always with the tolls included. It will also depend on the number of pieces of luggage when calculating the cost of the trip.

Though less private, another option is to take the buses that go directly to the air terminals. The only company that provides these bus services is called Manuel Tienda León.

It is advisable to always buy your taxi trip with a reputable "remis" company and not take any taxi at the airport.

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HEALTH

The National Health System in Argentina is completely free for visitors including students living in Argentina. However, it is important to understand that in Argentina there are three types of health systems: a) Public Health, b) Health provided through Social Works and c) Private Health.

In the case of our students, they can request advice with their counselors, in order to discuss the option of purchasing health insurance for travelers, as the case may be. It is strongly advised that students do have insurance.

BANKING SYSTEM AND FOREIGN CURRENCY EXCHANGE IN ARGENTINA

Many foreign banks are represented in Buenos Aires, in whose branches you can get help with the adjustment of your account to pesos and change your money.

However, you should visit any local bank of your choice or convenience to check the updated regulations and find out if you can open an account or if you will continue to manage your account abroad from a branch in Argentina.

Please not that government regulations can change without much notice and these may affect your ability to withdraw money or make payments. Always make sure you check the news and ask your bank for advice before travelling.

5 PERSONAL COMMONSENSE SAFETY RECOMMENDATIONS IN BUENOS AIRES

Do not exhibit expensive objects on the street: Leave your cell phone and camera in your pocket or in your case as you walk down the street.

Only change money but in exchange houses or banks.

Keep personal items such as bags with purchases inside, purses, backpacks, packages, etc. with you and near you.

Do not discuss financial matters in public, as if you are going to exchange money in local currency or to receive a transfer from abroad.

Always look before and after: when entering the subway, the bus, a restaurant or a cafe.

Be assured that in Buenos Aires the police will always be close. As in any cosmopolitan city, your personal safety depends largely on the precaution and prevention exercised.

Located in the neighborhood of Villa Crespo (near Palermo Soho), the row of shops along Calle Aguirre houses some brand stores of wellknown and trendy designers in Buenos Aires. These outlets are an ideal option for travelers looking for a safe shopping environment, with good value for money. The points of sale are very close to *Palermo Soho*, so you can end your afternoon shopping with a coffee or a dinner in the fashionable neighborhood.

PALERMO SOHO

Buyers in search of the most modern styles will find much to choose from, in the combination of urban and vintage boutiques of *Palermo Soho*. The prices in this neighborhood are higher than in other areas of the city, but its exclusive stores, with articles by young designers who offer unique and original designs, are perfect for the traveler looking for elegant clothes and accessories to add to your wardrobe.

You will also find internationally recognised designers, scattered among local boutiques. *Palermo Soho* is an attractive area to walk, eat and shop, so do not leave it out of your itinerary.

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AVENIDA SANTA FE

Probably the largest commercial area of Buenos Aires is *Avenida Santa Fe*, which starts at *Avenida 9 de Julio* and continues straight to *Avenida Scalabrini Ortiz*. Three kilometers full of stores in which buyers will find clothes, bags, shoes and accessories for all tastes, styles and budgets. The most exclusive stores are located near *Avenida 9 de Julio*, in the *Recoleta* neighborhood, but the stores in *Palermo* also offer an excellent opportunity to make good purchases in Buenos Aires.

CALLE FLORIDA

Located in the heart of Buenos Aires, *Calle Florida* is full of both local and street vendors. It is a classic pedestrian area of the city that is worth knowing, especially if you are looking for leather products and sports equipment. *Galerías Pacífico*, the famous shopping center housed within a splendid and elegant building, is also located there.

Going shopping the of Once neighborhood requires patience, since it involves walking in the middle of an area with a lot of garbage, but with the advantage of being able to find good products at a very cheap price. When visiting Once it is better to have a previous idea of what will be purchased, because street businesses are organized by type of product, such as fabrics, dresses, watches or lingerie. Many businesses offer wholesale sales. Once is a good place to go shopping and make some some money. It's important to know that while shoping at Barrio Once you should never stop taking care of your bag and belongings to avoid theft in the street.

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ABASTO SHOPPING

Located in the neighborhood of *Almagro*, in a restored 19th-century building, *Abasto* Shopping was home to the city's first fruit and vegetable market: it served as an important regional center for fresh produce. The area is historically linked to tango and the gigantic shopping center is located a few blocks from the house where the legend of tango, *Carlos Gardel* was born.

Today, his house has been transformed into a museum in his honor, and fans of tango can find all kinds of souvenirs and accessories at very affordable prices.

How to get to Abasto Shopping: It is located on Avenida Corrientes 3247.

Take the subway (line B, red) and get off at Carlos Gardel station.

ALTO PALERMO SHOPPING

Opened in 1990, Alto Palermo Shopping has become one of the most modern shopping centers in Buenos Aires, mainly due to its proximity to Palermo Soho and Recoleta. Alto Palermo Shopping offers a free shuttle service from the hotels.

How to get to Alto Palermo Shopping: It is located on Avenida Santa Fe 3253. Take the subway (line D, green) and get off at Bulnes station.



SHOPPING PASEO ALCORTA

Located in the exclusive neighborhood of *Palermo Chico*, a few blocks from the Museum of Latin American Art (MALBA), the *Paseo Alcorta* shopping center has become a point of reference for the latest trends in Argentine fashion. The exclusivity of its stores and its modern design make it an obligatory stop for fashion lovers.

How to get to Paseo Alcorta: It is located in Salguero and Av. Figueroa Alcorta. Take the bus line 67 or 130 and get off at Av. Figueroa Alcorta corner with Jerónimo Salguero. 5

PACIFIC GALLERIES

This popular shopping mall is located on Florida pedestrian street, and the only building is worth the visit. It is a National Historic Monument whose architecture, murals and ceiling paintings make it particularly attractive. It is possible to buy in style in an artistic environment: this is Galerias Pacifico! How to get to Galerias Pacifico: They are located in the Center of Buenos Aires, on the pedestrian street Florida 737 (corner Córdoba). Take the subway (line B, red color) and get off at Florida.

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BUENOS AIRES DESIGN

Right next to *Plaza Francia*, in *Recoleta*, is the Buenos Aires Design, a place entirely dedicated to interior design, architecture, high-end items for the home, and warehouses with exclusive designs where you can get the most innovative and elegant items for your home. After shopping to near death, you can have dinner in one of the many elegant restaurants located on their beautiful terrace.

How to get to Buenos Aires Design: It is located on Avenida Pueyrredón and Avenida Libertador. Take any of the following buses: 17, 61, 62, 67, 92, 93, 110, 130.

SHOPPING PATIO BULLRICH

At one time, this beautiful building, designed by the English architect Juan Waldorp and built in 1867, was used as an auction house for cattle, thoroughbred horses and even pieces of art. How to get to Patio Bullrich: It is located in Recoleta, it has two entrances: Av. Libertador 750 and Posadas 1245. Take any of the following buses: 62, 67, 92, 93, 110, 124, 130.
